

I love all the books by this brand. My 8 year old 2nd grader is reading above his reading level and he loves these books. He now wants to go up to level 5! Lol.. I took a chance on this one, as I didn't know the author and I'm always skeptical about writing styles for early readers. This one was funny and engaging, if a bit silly. The vocabulary is mostly controlled, though it could be a bit better. Mostly readable on an independent basis, which is important.

I love these series. But most important that my son does. I got 40+ books and he loves to read them (usually it is not that easy to make him read). I got mix of 2-3-4 levels for the second grader, second level is too easy, but it creates some fun and he reads them with pleasure. Love it, I would recommend it.

This book was not what I expected however it was a pleasant surprise. My 9 year old loved the story and how funny it was. Age appropriate for ages 6-9.

I think this book is great!. The reason I only rate it 3 stars is because the book is short and does not seem right for grades 2-3. It belongs more for grades 1-3, which Step into Reading would call step 3.
