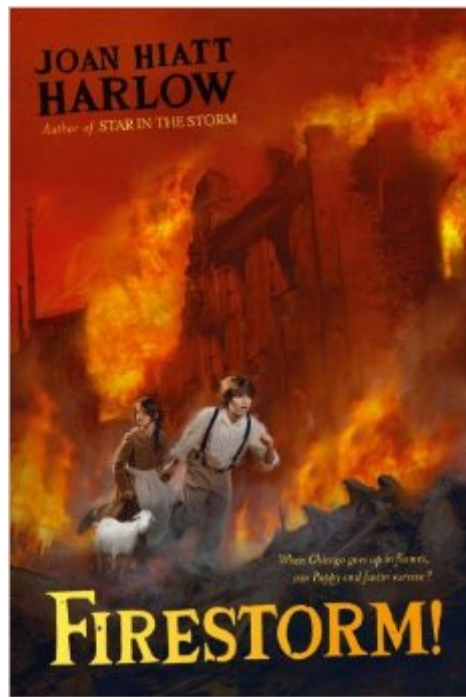


The book was found

Twelve-year-old Poppy is an orphan living in a rough Chicago neighborhood in 1871. Her unofficial "guardian" is Ma Brennan, who forces Poppy to steal and turn over all of her spoils to Ma Brennan. If Poppy doesn't do as Ma Brennan says, she won't have anywhere to sleep, nothing to eat, and will be severely beaten or worse.
On Saturday morning, September 30, Poppy accidentally knocks into Justin as she is trying to escape notice after picking

a woman's pocket. Thirteen-year-old Justin is different from Poppy in a lot of ways; he has a loving family, an adorable pet goat that Poppy loves, and Justin's father owns the most prestigious jewelry store in the city. Despite their differences, the two strike up an unlikely friendship that is soon to be tested. Although Poppy spends time at Justin's house, it is clear his father doesn't trust Poppy and is convinced she will surely steal from them. When Justin makes a mistake in his father's store and it appears that a valuable chain has been stolen, Justin's father blames Poppy. While Poppy is innocent, there doesn't seem to be any way to prove that. Just then, the Great Chicago Fire begins to swallow the city and its residents in its inferno. Like everyone else in Chicago, Justin and his family are trying to make their way to safety. So, too, is Poppy, and it is then that she sees an opportunity to clear her name, but she must risk everything, including, perhaps, her life, to do so. Riveting from start to finish, this work of historical fiction excels in every regard.

I read and loved *Firestorm*. Joan never disappoints her readers. Again she has created very real characters that you find yourself wishing you knew personally. The Chicago fire was a great historical event to center this heartwarming tale of an orphan who finds love in an unlikely place.
