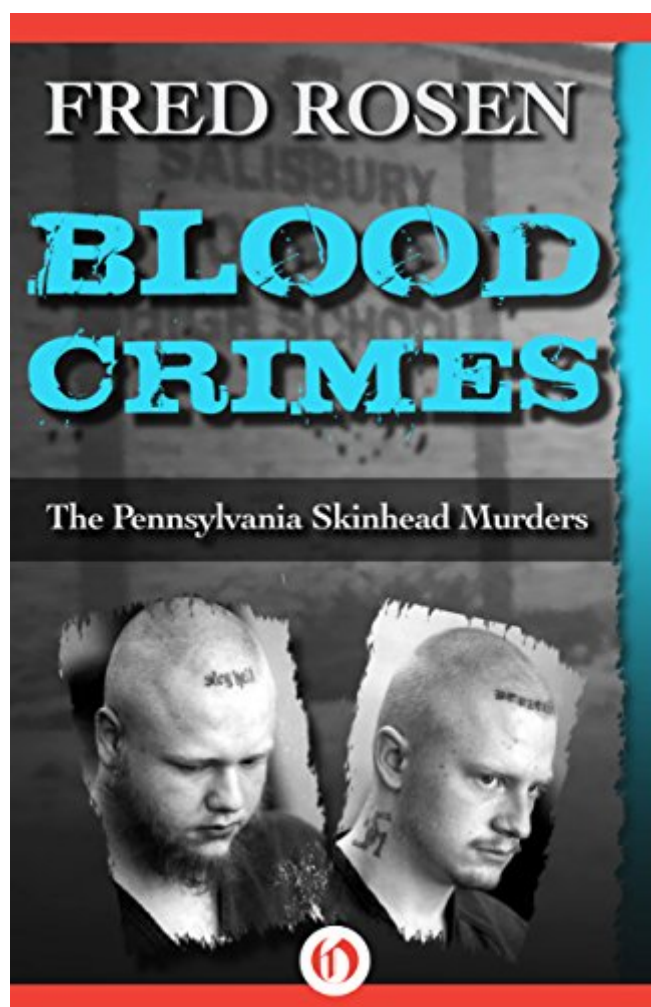

## Synopsis
